

AN INSIDER'S LOOK AT FOTOSEPTIEMBRE USA 2011

or sixteen years, the Fotoseptiembre USA International Photography Festival has celebrated photography with a unique and eclectic month long festival during the month of September. International, national, regional, and local artists alike will show off their most prized works of traditional photographs, digital images, photography based works, photographic installations, alternative processes, and everything in between in galleries, museums, art centers and exhibition spaces across San Antonio and the Texas Hill Country.

Enjoy yourself as photographers examine culture, social issues, look inward, outward and onward as they let viewers glimpse into their personal exploration of contemporary notions with striking simplicity and depth. This year's Fotoseptiembre USA 2011 marks several new milestones, both for the festival and for San Antonio's cultural landscape. In past years, Fotoseptiembre was thought of in North-South terms, as a cultural link to Mexico and Latin America. This year, more than ever, it has become a link to East and West, resulting in an emphasis on the more experimental approaches to the photographic arts. Fotoseptiembre USA has joined forces with the City of San Antonio Office of Cultural Affairs to present a series of exhibits of contemporary Taiwanese artists. The exhibits of breathtaking views from the Eastern World will give viewers a unique glimpse into the culture and life of China...a country that is so very different from our own. This historic exchange of art and culture can be

seen throughout many of the exhibits including "Introspectives: Photographs Of Taiwan 1960-2005" by Chang Chaotang at the City of San Antonio International Center on 203 South St. Mary's. "Animal Instinct" by Daniel Lee, is a survey exhibition of Lee's photography from 1993-2010. It showcases Lee's use of digital technology to explore the idea of human behavior in relation to animal behavior. Lee's exhibit can be seen at the San Antonio Museum of Art (SAMA). The many different exhibits of Taiwanese artist can be found at the City of San Antonio International Center, the Instituto Cultural de Mexico and the SAMA.

Of course, Fotoseptiembre USA is committed to curating exhibits of international artists as part of the series of cultural exchanges, and is also presenting the works of photographic artists from Poland, France, Sweden, Canada, Peru, and Mexico. You can find these exhibits, such as ""Mini Series III: Superficie" by Alex Dorfs-man (Mexico) and "Mini Series III: Staple Street Project" by Chris Zedano (Peru/New York), on display at the Instituto Cultural de Mexico. Another milestone is the 2011 Society for Photographic Education South Central Regional Conference, which will feature exhibits and lectures at the UTSA 1604 campus, the UTSA Satellite Space, and the San Antonio Library. Be sure to visit the UTSA 1604 campus for "A Photographic Survey & Selected Works From The Region," a collaborative exhibit that includes works from over 28 regional artists, such as Kenda North. Who is also giving a fantastic Artist Talk at the

San Antonio Central Library.

Additionally, there are a core group of exhibits, which are produced, curated and presented by the Fotoseptiembre organizers. These spectacular exhibits are considered the anchor exhibits of Fotoseptiembre, and should not be missed. You can find these at the Southwest School of Art, SAMA, and UTSA. You can also visit Say Si, Blue Star Contemporary Art Center and Bihl Haus Arts, as well as private galleries such as Gallery Nord and Rendon Photography & Fine Art. These highlights are just a quick peek at the photographic treats that you will encounter. Fotoseptiembre USA 2011 features several hundred artists from around the world in over 60 venues across the San Antonio area.

Fotoseptiembre USA takes place every September. Be sure to explore the eclectic scope of works on exhibition and maybe even take a piece of art or two home. Aside from the many exhibits on display in San Antonio, galleries in Boerne, Fredericksburg, Kerrville, Spring Branch, Bulverde and New Braunfels will also be showcasing fine photographic works. All events are free and open to the public. For more information and complete exhibit and events list visit www.fotoseptiembreusa.com.
